The boys 4x100 meter relay set a D5 record with a time of 43.21. Black explained, "I'm just excited our four-byone got to states," he added. "We have all new guys this year. This is a great experience for them." Izzy Slezak repeated as a district champ in the 200 with a time of 25.54 and took second in the 100. "I'm always looking forward to running this event at districts," Slezak said of the 200. Jackson Sotosky was the winner of long jump with a distance of 21 feet 4 inches to earn his spot at states. Sotosky also placed second in high jump and third in triple jump. Sotosky stated, "I am excited for states. I am going to try my hardest and hope for the best. It would be wonderful to get top 10, but setting a PR would be great."
