With school shootings on a rise, Conemaugh Township took an active step to prevent these happenings at our school. On August 22, 2023, Conemaugh Township had one last drill before kids stepped foot in the building: what to do when an intruder invades our school.

These teachers were put into uncomfortable and unthinkable situations. This training includes the discussion on the proper procedures to be taken, multiple scenarios, the sounds of AKs being shot, live action drills, and more. To help with this training, multiple people from local fire departments, EMS, police departments, and even a SERT team came together. This training was not only for the school employees, but also for the trauma team at Conemaugh Hospital. One teacher from Conemaugh Township, Fred Mainhart, was used to see how Conemaugh Hospital's trauma team would react to active shooter trauma. Mainhart said, "The people who were in the trauma room didn't treat it like a drill. They used excellent protocol and worked very well as a team."

On September 7, Conemaugh Township was able to interview Police Chief, Vincent Zangaglia. Chief Zangaglia states, "The main success was making the mistakes to learn and make everybody better and understand what needs to be fixed." The police department is now able to realize how fast these experiences could happen in real life and the adrenaline that comes with it. The people who mainly behind this drill was the Prehospital Operations Manager as well as our superintendent, Mrs. Dull. They were able to communicate together and work to make this drill very successful for all.

Overall, Conemaugh Township was put into uncomfortable situations to better protect its students, faculty, and staff. This drill allows for many parents and guardians to feel more at ease. The drill was a great success for the faculty and staff of our school.



This is a great opportunity for our school, and the CT Boutique is going to be a great addition to our school. Hope to see you there thrifting!


Band Competition By Katelyn Wiley

Donald Trump's Arrest

Former president, Donald Trump, has been arrested four times this year. He has been accused of election interference in the 2020 presidential race and handling classified documents among other charges. All in all, Trump has denied all wrongdoing in all of the cases, and has claimed, without evidence, that prosecutors and officials in Washington, Georgia, and New York are trying to target his reelection bid.

The first time he was indicted was in March, for thirty-four felony counts by the Manhattan grand jury. This incident made him the first U.S. president to be indicted in history. Trump was also accused of seeking to conceal hush money payments made to two women: Stormy Daniels and Karen McDougal. Both of the women claimed to have past relationships with Trump before the 2016 election. In April, Trump pleaded not guilty. In June, Trump was indicted for thirty-seven felony counts. This charge was for allegedly storing hundreds of classified documents. Charges for this include: willful retention of national defense information in violation of the Espionage Act and conspiracy to obstruct justice. For these offenses, he was arrested and pleaded not guilty. The third indictment of Trump was for allegedly trying to steal the 2020 presidential election. For that, Trump was charged with conspiracy to Defraud the U.S., conspiracy to obstruct an official proceeding, obstruction of an attempt to obstruct an official proceeding, and conspiracy against rights. Trump, again, pleaded not guilty. His most recent arrest happened last month at a county jail in Georgia. His charge was that he tried to steal the 2020 election in the peach state. Fulton County District Attorney Fani Willis charged Trump under the state's Racketeer Influenced

and Corrupt Organizations, or RICO, Act. has historically been used to target organized crime and drug operations. Trump is just one of 19 defendants in the state indictment, along with his former attorney, Rudy Giuliani and former White House Chief of Staff Mark Meadows. For this he can face up to 20 years in prison.

All in all, Trump was shortly released. His time in jail consisted of being booked, fingerprinted, and photographed for a mug shot. Trump was released just 20 minutes after. "What has taken place here is a travesty of justice," Trump told reporters on the tarmac, moments before he boarded his plane to leave Atlanta. "We did nothing wrong at all, and we have every single right to challenge an election we think is dishonest."

Florida Hurricane

There have been many hurricanes in Florida over the past several months. In August, Tallahassee and many other Florida cities killed the record for warmest month by nearly a full degree! It also closed out a cruel summer with the first ever major hurricane landfall between the Panama City to Cedar Key areas, and the first hurricane-force inland wind event in the "Big Bend" in at least 75 years.

The activity is most common in September, and does not immediately affect the continental United States. Recently the National Hurricane Center started issuing advisories on Tropical Depression 13, which is now known as Tropical Storm Lee. Lee is estimated to be between West Africa and the Lesser Antilles, and is now moving northwest at about 15 miles per hour. Due to how fast Lee is currently moving, Lee should gain enough latitude to pass north of the U.S. Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico in around five days, which could potientally affect us.

"However, the northern Antilles should monitor Lee carefully, as the intensity expectations for this hurricane are wild," the Tallahassee Democrat stated. Lee has been officially categorized as a Category 4 hurricane.

Zach Bryan's Recent Success By Luke Haight




