At this event, students compete in different categories such as On Demand Video, Board Game Design, and Forensic Science. MLB Rule Change

After an agonizingly long 99-day stalemate between the MLB and MLBPA, baseball has made a return to the professional level. The two organizations have requested for the addition of a new collective bargaining agreement (CBA). With the approval of the new CBA, many of the rules in the MLB have been modified and rewritten.

Some new rulings will occur during the 2022 season, while several others will be implemented in the 2023 season. The new rule for the 2022 season is that the National League will adopt a designated hitter. This means that a nonfielding player will be allowed to be in the batting order. As for 2023: pitch clocks will be used, there will be a ban on defensive shifts, an automatic ball/ strike zone will be implemented, and there will be larger bases.

There are also new rules regarding the MLB Draft and the postseason. In the draft, a draft lottery will be implemented to discourage teams losing on purpose to get higher picks, and draft picks will be induced. As for the postseason, 12 teams will now be granted the opportunity to compete for the World Series Title. Also, there will be no man on second at the start of extra innings.

All-in-all, the new rulings implemented in the MLB are meant to bring a new aspect to the game. These rules will hopefully create a more entertaining element for both the fans and players. No matter what sport you enjoy watching most, the MLB is definitely something to keep an eye on this year.

Sugar Cookie Recipe By Alonna Bracken

Ingredients:

- $2\frac{3}{4}$ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ¹/₂ teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup butter, softened
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups white sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract



Directions:

Step 1: Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C). In a small bowl, stir together flour, baking soda, and baking powder. Set aside.

Step 2: In a large bowl, cream together the butter and sugar until smooth. Beat in egg and vanilla. Gradually blend in the dry ingredients. Roll rounded teaspoonfuls of dough into balls, and place onto ungreased cookie sheets.

Step 3: Bake 8 to 10 minutes in the preheated oven, or until golden. Let stand on a cookie sheet for two minutes before removing to cool on wire racks.




Remembering Grunge Icons By Sasha Tarabrin

On April 5th of 1994 and 2002, we lost two of the most prominent figures in grunge music history: *Nirvana's* Kurt Cobain, and *Alice in Chains'* Layne Staley. With their introspective lyrics and brooding production, they were a part of the first wave of the grunge movement. Millions of fans found solace in their work - which brought light to heavy topics such as substance abuse, mental illness, growing up among toxic masculinity, and an abhorrence of fame.

Cobain and Staley sang about the things that many go through but few actually want to talk about. They used their music to relate to the misfits, the punks, and the losers. In this, they gained a following of misunderstood kids who had finally found voices for their thoughts. With Kurt Cobain pushing against strict societal norms, and Layne Staley divulging into the dark depths of drug addiction, the two bands created a striking foundation for the future of grunge music as we know it today.

Unfortunately, both gave into their illnesses, (with Cobain's suicide and Staley's fatal overdose) but their music gave new hope to those who were suffering alongisde of them. It transcended among social groups and created advocacy for equality and human rights, bringing newfound tolerance and breaking stigmas relating to things like mental health and substance abuse. Cobain and Staley's influence forever changed the ideals of grunge music - and that's something the music world is thankful for.
