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



To conclude, developing positive study habits is something anyone can do. Studying is an important part of the schooling experience.



Porter then "took himself out of that game after less than three minutes, claiming illness, while none of his stats met the totals set in the parlay." These actions led to the second NBA ban in history,

OJ Simpson

Orenthal James "OJ" Simpson, a man whose life and legacy were tainted by the accusations against him, died on April 10, 2024 at the age of 76 in Las Vegas, Nevada. OJ was born on July 9, 1947 in San Francisco. In his early days, many viewed him as an all-American idol as both an actor and a star football player. He was an American football player and actor who played in the National Football League for 11 seasons, mainly with the Buffalo Bills. However, his life took a drastic turn after he was arrested in 1994 for the brutal murders of his ex-wife and mother to his five children, Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend Ronald Goldman. Many people believed him to have committed the murders, while others found it hard to believe. Simpson was taken to court on account of the murders. His legal defense team famously argued that evidence had been mishandled and that there was racial bias in the investigation. This trial divided the nation, highlighting the different stances between racial profiling and the deaths of the two victims. In the end, on October 3, 1995 OJ Simpson was acquitted of all charges in the criminal trial. Simpson later wrote a book in September of 2007 titled If I Did It: Confessions of the Killer. The book discusses the theoretical plans of the murders of Brown and Goldman. The publication of this book caused a major outcry because of his overturned murder convictions. Whether OJ truly committed these crimes or was truly the football star many loved and idolized, will now forever remain a debate as he is laid to rest.

Terror on the Patapsco River

On March 16th at 1:30 a.m., an enormous cargo vessel smashed into a support column of the Francis Scott Key Bridge. This particular bridge runs over 57,000 feet over the Patapsco River. This not only injured several people, but also caused the bridge to collapse.

This impact caused a huge part of the bridge to collapse into the water. At 1:30 a.m. that morning, the first 911 call came in and reported a ship hit the bridge. After the call, all shipping traffic was suspended at this port. The ship that was involved in the crash was called Dali, a Singapore-flagged vessel. The ship had just left the Baltimore Port when it lost propulsion and then crashed into the bridge.

A search and recovery mission was set to take place the next day. Brian Hudson was the FBI special agent in charge of the search. The debris from accident had not settled yet, making it unsafe to use a dive team. The FBI then deployed a ROV with sonar technology instead until something was found. The ROV is an remotely operated vehicle, looking for sunken vehicles or human remains. Along with the FBI's efforts, the U.S. Coast Guard was also actively looking for missing people. Of the six total people believed to be missing, two were pulled from the river. The people rescued were then sent to the University of Maryland Medical Center for treatment. Later in the week, it was revealed that six people total were presumed dead.

At one point this event was considered a "mass casualty event." Some people close by shared, "Earthquake — sounded like a big bash of thunder, and then just like I said it felt like an earthquake, the whole house vibrated. Like my house was falling down."

Total Solar Eclipse

On April 8, 2024, a total solar eclipse moved across North America. Mexico, the United States, and Canada were all in the path of totality. A total solar eclipse can occur when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, which blocks the face of the Sun. During this time, it was dark as if it was dawn or dusk.

Most of North America was not in the direct path, but still witnessed a partial eclipse. The first place that saw the top totality was Mazatlán's, then continued northwest toward Texas. There were around 31.6 million people who live in the path of totality, which is where the moon fully blocked out the sun. This path of totality was between 108 and 122 miles wide.

This event was very fascinating to watch. However, there were some safety measures that needed to be in place. Viewing any part of the bright Sun through a camera lens, binoculars, or a telescope without a special-purpose solar filter will instantly cause severe eye damage. An article on CBS NEWS shared, "There's no amount of sunglasses that people can put on that will make up for the filtering that the ISO standard filters and the eclipse glasses provide." The only acceptable eyewear are eclipse glasses and they must have an IOS label.

Total solar eclipses happen around the world every 11 to 18 months, but they often do not cross paths with millions of people. The next total solar eclipse will not happen again until 2044 in Montana and North Dakota.
