Mr. Lesko grew up in the small town of Jenners. located just south of Boswell, Pennsylvania. A graduate of North Star High School, he was always active in sports and academics. He went on to attend Thiel College in Greenville, where he played college basketball. However, an unfortunate knee injury led to a career-ending surgery. which changed his passion for sports into coaching. After Thiel, he continued his studies at Indiana University of Pennsvlvania (IUP).

Mr. Lesko holds a Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics with a Minor in Physics. He is certified as an Instructional II Teacher in both Mathematics and General Sciences Mr. Lesko's coaching career began in his late teens when he started coaching basketball camps. After graduating from college, he spent 18 months at a church camp, where he strengthened his leadership and communication skills. He then went on to teach Algebra and Geometry at Nelson County High School in Kentucky, where he also served as an Assistant Coach for the Girls Basketball Team.

In the fall of 1993, Mr. Lesko made the move to CT, where he has been teaching and coaching ever since. His role at CT has included coaching both basketball and golf. With over 32 years of service, his dedication and passion for education and sports continue to shine.

Outside of the classroom, Mr. Lesko is happily married to his wife, Lisa, and the couple shares their home with four beloved dogs: Presley, Percy, Billy, and Jackson.

When asked about what he enjoys most about working at CT, he shares, "I guess my favorite part about working at CT, regardless of whether it's with students or colleagues, is the workability. It makes it easy to come to work on a daily basis."
