#### State College School Arrest

20-year old Braeden Phillips was planning a deadly attack on State College Area High School. He is charged with conspiracy to commit murder and unlawful possession of a firearm. He is now being held at the Centre County Correctional Facility. This was not just an idle threat muttered in passing, but rather a planned act of violence. On Friday April 11th, the police were tipped off by a concerned citizen and executed a search warrant in his home that day. He was arrested on April 11, 2025. He was planning to attack the school on April 21, 2025, the day after the 26th anniversary of the Columbine High School Massacre.

This threat was directly at this high school and no others. Phillip says that the school failed his educational needs and failed him. Phillip told witnesses that the shooting would be on the main staircase once the class change started. He also planned to place bombs in the bathroom. Witnesses also knew that he had a "hit list" of individuals he was targeting. He found in possession of glock-style handguns. In response to this, the school has increased their safety measures while still using their metal detectors. Students are also required to have their student ID on them at all times while on the campus. Matt Hertlein, the school resource officer states, "School safety is imperative for us." The superintendent stated, "With the potential threat thwarted, we wish to express our gratitude to our school resource officer, Matt Hertlein, and the State College police for their swift response and coordination to protect our high school community."

Luckily, this planned attack was prevented because a citizen followed the mindset of "see something, say something." If you hear or know something, it's always best to speak up.



#### Mental Health Awareness

CT offers a variety of mental health resources for students throughout the school year, and even during the summer. Township's very own Sarah Mientus, our REACH counselor, provides an in depth interview on the different programs readily available within and outside of our school. "REACH provides FREE mental health counseling IN SCHOOL throughout the year," Sarah shared. Additional services include IMPACT Drug and Alcohol Counseling, DBHS School-Based Counseling, and CBITS, a program designed to reduce symptoms of PTSD, depression, and behavioral problems. Students can also access TRIBELINE to connect with a REACH counselor and receive help for themselves or their families. The CARE Team and Safe2Say are also in place to help identify students in need and connect them with appropriate resources.

Since mental health concerns aren't always visible, teachers, peers, and family members play a crucial role in identifying when a student may be struggling. "Some signs of deteriorating mental health show in hygiene, attendance, mood, grade changes, etc.," Sarah Mientus states. Safe2Say offers another layer of support, allowing students to report concerns anonymously. "Ultimately, the adage 'if you see something, say something' can help a lot in helping your peers receive the help they need."

To reduce stereotypes and promote awareness, CT staff participate in educational programs like the 7th grade Botvin class and mental health check-ins. "I think this is a very easy way to inform students about mental health and reduce stigma," one counselor noted. Fun, stress-relief days during exams or testing also support student mental wellness. "CT has SO MANY fun dress down day activities for staff and students," and the phrase "Handle With Care" is used in emails to remind teachers to be extra mindful when a student is struggling.

While staff support is strong, the school also encourages peer involvement. "I feel like SADD is always up to something in the school. I would love to see more peer support programs and student-led mental health initiatives more frequently throughout the school year," said Mientus. When it comes to involving families, updates are provided based on age and consent. In cases of crisis, CT uses the Columbia Suicide Severity Rating Scale to determine the level of risk and take the necessary steps to keep students safe. "When students and adults can talk about these thoughts and feelings, we can do something about it!"

To conclude, Conemaugh Township truly values its students and protects them both physically and mentally. Students have access to several platforms to seek help, and keep them safe. The REACH program is a great way to get mental health counseling in school throughout the year.

#### Trevor Bauer Sues Against Accusations

Trevor Bauer is a former Major League Baseball (MLB) pitcher and a Cy Young Award winner. Bauer has been in the middle of a highly publicized legal battle that follows accusations of sexual misconduct. The accusations surfaced in 2021, which led to a severe consequence for his career, including a suspension by the MLB according to their domestic violence and sexual assault policy. However, Bauer denied the claims against him on multiple accounts, stating that the interactions between the two of them happened with full consent and that the only victim is him for being put under false allegations. In response to this, he filed several lawsuits against his accuser and multiple social media outlets, stating that they were out to harm his reputation and his livelihood.

While he is now facing claims from a second accuser, his primary accuser is a woman who accused Bauer of committing a non-consensual act of violence during their time together. Different social media platforms have become a battleground for users sharing and amplifying details about the accusers and the accused, often without the full story or factual support. Time will tell what will come of these allegations against Trevor Bauer.

#### Baseball Fan Injured Falling Off Stands

During the seventh inning of the Pittsburgh Pirates game against the Chicago Cubs at PNC Park on May 2nd, a Pirates fan was hospitalized in critical condition after falling from the stands onto the field.

Kavan Markwood fell 20 feet onto the right side of the field after tumbling over the railing of the bleachers. Medical assistants, coaches from both teams, and the PNC Park personnel immediately came to his aid before he was transferred from the field to Allegheny General Hospital. The Pirates manager, Derek Shelton, witnessed the incident. Shelton stated, "The fact of how it went down and then laying motionless while a play is going on ... it's extremely unfortunate. I mean, that's an understatement." Markwood is still receiving treatment for his life-threatening injuries. When the fan fell, a second person, later identified as a friend, jumped out of the outfield wall to help him. The game paused for about 10 minutes to help the him. Another fan, Bobby Kettler, captured the fall on his phone while filming a crucial play. Bob Nutting, principal owner and chairman of the board of the Pittsburgh Pirates, stated, "We are all deeply saddened and truly heartbroken after the terrible accident that occurred last night. It was one of the most difficult moments many of us have ever experienced."

The incident has brough into question the safety of the fan sections within the professional stadium, specifically regarding the height of the safety rails and barriers. The Pirates organization and fans worldwide are praying for a full recovery after the shocking incident.


