#### **Bridge Dedication** By Tori Dombrosky and Natalie Kimmel

On October 8th, 2021, a nearby bridge was dedicated to Corporal Anthony G. Orlandi. The memorial bridge refers to the southbound and northbound lanes of the U.S. Route 219 over state Route 601 in Jerome. Corporal Anthony G. Orlandi was a light weapons infantry leader with Company L of the U.S. Army's 3rd Battalion. He was killed in action on January 12, 1952, and was never able to be returned to his family. Orlandi was one of fourteen U.S. soldiers killed on Hill 472 in the Korean War. He earned a Purple Heart and Silver Star for his bravery.

The bridge memorial service was commemorated with Orlandi's family members and members of the community. Natalie Kimmel and Tori Dombrosky were chosen to represent the Connumach staff at the memorial service. Tori said, "The service was quite an experience to be apart of. The family was all very welcoming and friendly. Overall, I am very thankful to be apart of such an opportunity." Natalie stated that, "I am honored to be included in such a special moment for the family of Anthony G. Orlandi. This dedication provides a sense of comfort for his family, and it allows for his memory and sacrifices to live on."

Pennsylvania Senator, Patrick Stefano, passed the legislation for the bridge dedication to occur. He spoke at the service and quoted, "It means a lot to me because they [the family] remember, but none of us do. They remember the person he was and the sacrifices he made; this dedication is so important to the family so that they can recognize and honor Anthony Anthony joined the service at sixteen, and was never able to graduate high school. School resource officer, Mr. Mike Bunchich, organized an opportunity, along with superintendent, Mr. T.J. Kakabar, who allowed for the creation of this diploma. They, along with high school principal, Mr. James Foster, have worked through the years and have made sure that Conemaugh Township fallen veterans have received a diploma from the school.

Mr. James Foster assisted in presenting the diploma to the family. He stated in his presentation, "It brings me great honor to offer to the family of Anthony G. Orlandi, a Conemaugh Township high school diploma, as an appreciation for everything he has sacrificed."
